## **COVID-19 Update**

Following the changes in advice about Covid-19 at the end of February, please be aware of the following:

- Pupils who have any of the main Covid-19 symptoms should still stay at home, order a PCR test (until 31st March as free testing will end on 1st April) and avoid contact with others whilst awaiting the result.
   This is current guidance by the government but will be updated on 1st April.
- Although the legal requirement to self-isolate has ended, adults and children who test positive are still
  advised to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for at least 5 full days and then continue
  to follow the guidance until they have received 2 negative test results on consecutive days.

- If a parent or carer insists on a pupil attending school where they have a confirmed or suspected case of Covid-19, we can take the decision to refuse the pupil if, in our reasonable judgement, it is necessary to protect other pupils and staff from possible infection with Covid-19.
- Contacts are no longer required to self-isolate or advised to take daily tests, and routine contact tracing
  has ended children and young people who are contacts should attend their education settings as
  usual. The legal requirement has been removed for close contacts who are not fully vaccinated to selfisolate
- We continue to follow control measures in school, such as increased ventilation and handwashing to
  prevent the spread of Covid-19. However, staff will no longer be testing twice weekly for COVID-19 as
  lateral flow tests are no longer being supplied by the government.

# Red Nose Day 18th March

We are looking forward to joining in with Red Nose Day on Friday 18<sup>th</sup> March. The School Council have decided that they would like the following events to take place, in order to raise money for Comic Relief:



- Non-school Uniform day, where children can wear their own clothes (and red noses etc.) and are also encouraged to come with a funny hairstyle. A payment has been set up on Gateway for parents, with a suggested minimum donation of £1. We request that all parents who are able make a donation for Children in Need in November, only 50% of all parents did so.
- Bake Sale the school council are asking parents to send in donations of cakes which they will sell on the day. Please send in your bakes on Friday 18<sup>th</sup> March, along with some coins for your child to spend. It is vitally important that, due to allergies, bakes MUST CONTAIN NO NUTS OF ANY KIND OR SESAME SEEDS/OIL.

#### Ukraine

Many children have expressed that they are feeling worried or concerned about the situation in Ukraine. This is especially the case for our older children who are exposed to a lot of information online, much of which may not be factually accurate or may be intentionally shocking, in order to gain more traction/views. # **Start of Day Reminders**

- School starts at 8.40am and children are expected to be in school at this time. However, class doors remain open until 8.50am and children should not be brought in through the front office between 8.40am and 8.50am. Parents must drop children off at the class doors.
- After 8.50am, class doors and the school gates are closed and children who are late must be signed in by their parent at the front office. Parents must not drop of children at the top of the steps and leave them to walk in by themselves.
- We request that parents do not drive onto the school grounds at the start or end of day, unless
  permission has been given, as this traffic is dangerous for other parents and children who may be
  waiting or walking on the drive/path.
- The bushes at the front of the school have recently been cut back and this has left a lot of sharp edges. It is important that children do not play in these bushes before or after school, for their safety.

Thank you once again to all parents who took the time to fill out the survey on Parents' Evening or at home. We had 100 surveys completed and are really pleased to see that parents overwhelmingly feel that their children are safe in school, teaching is good, staff have high expectations and that our communication is good.

Where the survey has highlighted pockets of issues with behaviour or homework, we will be looking further into these areas. The other most frequent areas that parents raised in the comments section, that related to the whole school rather than individual children or classes were:

- More parents' events in school We would definitely like to have more events in school and hope that the summer term will see the return of 'Learning Together' class events, as well as Friends of the Cangle events, such as the summer fair. Parents can also help make the Friends events more frequent and successful by volunteering to help out.
- More varied range of after school clubs/more after school clubs One of the disadvantages of being a small school is not having as many staff who are able to offer clubs during or after school. For staff wellbeing, we do not require any staff to run clubs unless they feel they have the time to do so. Unfortunately, one of the challenges of planning, resourcing and marking good lessons mean that many staff do not have time after/during school to run clubs. Furthermore, at the moment, nine members of staff are involved in the School Led Tutoring Programme, which means that a lot of staff are busy after school, or doing extra before school. If parents are interested in any particular sports clubs, I can request that Prestige run other clubs after school, so please do get in contact. If any parents have a particular skill and would like to run a different kind of club at school, this could be arranged (subject to Safeguarding requirements) so please get in touch. It may be that some staff will be able to offer different lunch or after school clubs, once the School Led Tuition Programme ends.

- More cold lunch options we do not employ the kitchen staff directly but will pass this on to the catering team to see if it is possible.
- More school trips we currently try to do at least 1 visit a term but will be looking at how we can increase this provision to 1 per half term. We try to balance local visits with visits further afield, so that there is less of a financial burden on parents.
